The Le Mans Experience

I was fortunate enough to mark off a bucket list item this year. On June 14th and 15th, my wife and I attended the 24 Hours of Le Mans. We are PCA members from the Fox Valley Region, and regularly attend the American Le Mans Series races, now the Tudor United Sports Car Championship Series at Road America in Elkhart Lake, Wisconsin. It is an annual event we do not miss. We attended Sebring last year and Le Mans was an eventual, required event.

During the trip to France I wondered how one adequately prepares for a race filled with the rich history and legend of Le Mans. I also considered Porsche, of course. The most wins in Le Mans history. Now, after a 16 year absence, Porsche was returning with the 919 Hybrid and the 991 based RSR. The 911 had already won the 24 Hours of Daytona earlier this year in the GTLM class. I knew we were in for an exciting race.

The checklist: tickets purchased with access to the paddock area; check. Plane tickets; check. English/French dictionary to handle the most necessary phrases; check. We were ready for the event.

The Le Mans Experience

It had been years since I traveled overseas. Going through TSA security and being a part of the huddled masses shuffling toward the international gates was inspiring and humbling. On the other side of security awaited an oasis of duty free liquor, shops and restaurants, carefully designed to extract the first (or last) tourist dollars flowing through the rivers of terminal gates. American capitalism and ingenuity in full display as a perfected art.

The morning of day one of the race was sunny and the air was crisp and cool. We chose to arrive at the race with a tour group to avoid what I anticipated would be a steep learning curve. It paid off as our tour bus parked only 100 yards from the entry to the track. A crowd of 250,000 fans strong was already engaged in the pre-race rituals of enjoying great food and staking out the best vantage point to view the race. I have been to many professional sporting events, but nothing prepared me for the magnitude of Le Mans. The sheer number of people around a track that is over 8 miles long is astounding. The amount of exhibits, teams and cars to observe before the race was fantastic. 54 cars were to start the race, which would begin at 3 p.m., sharp.

The race began and the Toyota and Audi Hybrids jumped out to an early lead, which was dashed when rain showers curiously began, leading to a crash. The showers were accompanied by sunny weather on either side, which gave a surreal presence to the race. The cars dashing by the T34 grandstands where we were seated left a trail of mist, which almost appeared as a vapor trail.

The race went on, and a great battle ensued within the various classes of cars throughout the quiet of the night. Watching the battles led me to think about the Le Mans experience. What is it? It is a great and wonderful spectacle. A celebration of motors and racing. A cacophony of colorful languages spoken in various parts of the world. The scent of food, fuel, brakes and exhaust permeated the air. It was mixed with the aroma of rain covered fields of grass from the nearby countryside.

The Le Mans Experience

During the race one hears cheers and clapping from the crowds when a driver recovers from a crash, or when a mechanical issue is fixed with split second ingenuity. Celebratory car horns echo in the air, mixed with the voice of French announcers bringing the race to life. Pneumatic wrenches scatter other sounds as the pit crews quickly tend to the cars with perfectly timed precision. Quick revs from the engines and spinning tires scrambling for adhesion out of the pits remind everyone of the raw power of these machines.

There is something communal about racing. The collective goal of achieving speed without compromising efficiency. How else can one explain the desire of fans to travel around the world to spend 24 fantastic hours in a row watching the impossible become real?

On Day Two the sun rose over a sleep deprived cache of drivers, pit crews, engineers and fans. The track was covered with a layer of debris in spots. The stout hearted awoke in sleeping bags alongside the track. The once bright headlights of the race cars became less prominent as the sun rose. The race continued on into the day.

With about two hours remaining in the race, the 919 Hybrid, #20 held the lead. The #14 car of the 919 series was not far back. Then mechanical trouble forced the cars to retire. Destiny delayed, but Porsche had the #14 car run the last lap to demonstrate Porsche's determination and claim to the future. In the end, Audi claimed the overall 2014 Le Mans win. Porsche Team Manthey brought the 911 RSR to the podium for the LMGTE pro class. A large crowd congregated at the finish line to celebrate the race with the promise that it would begin again in 364 days at 3 p.m., sharp.

FVR Tech: Carrera Engine Removal

First Time 1987 Carrera Engine Drop - Chapter 2

Well the first of the side trips on the road to disassembly occurred today. Working in the engine bay I had glanced down at the bumper and noticed that the right bumper strip was pulled away from the car about ½". That's about 6mm for you metric folks. I said to myself, "Self. I wonder what would happen if I just pushed it back in towards the bumper."



Well I pushed and the heard a noise similar to one of those rain sticks from the 1980's as the rusted away mounting plate crumpled and crackled and the bits and pieces of rust fell to the spill pan on the floor, sounding like a gentle rain on a tin roof. Again I spoke to myself, "Darn." Actually it was a bit more colorful than that.

I found that the metal plate inside the rubber

had disintegrated and was only being held together by the surrounding rubber of the bumper strip. I pulled out the plug covering the screw hole for one of the two 5mm screws holding the strip in place and found that it had rusted into a small blob of rust where once had been a screw, washer and nut. I removed the remains and after struggling a bit with the other 5mm stud and nut holding the strip on, it unceremoniously fell



away from the car. I touched up the rust around the mounting hole and sealed it up with some leftover black paint. Since this will be behind the bumper strip I'm not too worried about cosmetics.



After a lot of searching, I found that this is not a cheaply replaced component. So I opened my wallet and ordered the replacement, reminding myself to not touch any more suspicious looking bumps on the car.

Meanwhile, back at the original project, I removed cruise control cable and the heater blower elbow clearing a path to the electronics on the left side of the engine bay. I made myself a mental note to seriously look at repairing the

cruise cable sometime in the near future. It is another part that is no longer available for the mid 80's Carrera. One would think that if a part is prone to breakage, someone would come up with a way to repair or replace it. Anyway I digress.

I have also removed the electrical cover on the left side to gain easier access to the electrical connections from the body to the engine. I'll be looking more closely at the wires to see which ones need to be disconnected or not.

I had sprayed the hose clamps to the breather hoses on the right hand side with some penetrating oil to free up the rust that was on them. I also removed the air control box in order to give myself some extra room in the very cramped space of the engine compartment. After the lube had done its work, I moved back to the right side of the engine to remove the hose clamps and the breather hoses to the oil tank.





There is an upper hose, a lower hose and also a small breather hose and a vacuum line that run to an emission valve next to the oil filler tube. While the clamps are very difficult to get at with any kind of wrench or screw driver, they came undone quite easily. I made myself another mental note to make sure that the clamps are turned to a more favorable position when reinstalling them to make it a lot easier.

With some additional room in the engine compartment I removed the coil wire, 14 pin harness connection to the left side electrical panel and the connectors for the cylinder head temperature sensor, the engine speed sensor, the reference sensor and the oxygen sensor.

Feeling pretty good I decided to stick my head under the car again. This time removed the left CV axle joint, the left hot air hose, the shift linkage and the transmission ground strap before coming up for air. The hot air hose on this side was in bad shape like the right side. More parts to replace.




Just a quick note about the shift linkage though. Most of the documentation I have read directed to remove the interior hatch between the rear seats. Another surprise was that, starting with the G50 transmission in 1987, the linkage connection is inside a rubber boot underneath the car

and not accessed from the interior. It takes some working but you can slowly slide the boot back and over the coupling and undo the 13mm bolt holding the coupling onto the transmission shaft. Then you just slide the shift coupling forward and off the shaft. This is a picture of the coupler removed.

I noticed that Bentley indicates to disconnect the speedometer wires in the in the access port and push them through the body toward the transmission. The bad news is that the hole is plugged by a hard wire grommet. A little push on the grommet and the whole harness was able to be moved outside the compartment.









Next thing under the car is to disconnect the throttle linkage. Removing this ball joint is fairly simple, but you must remember to remove the small clip that holds the ball into the socket on the linkage. It will not release without removing the clip. Believe me, I tried.



The next thing under the car is the hydraulic clutch line bracket and the actuator. These things look like they are difficult to get to so I am taking my time and soaking the bolts well with rust penetrant. Once those parts are disconnected and moved out of the way I can move back to the engine bay topside. Just a couple of steps to do there and then on to the drop. Its slow but I am getting there.

Oh well, baby steps.....baby steps....



FVR Recipe: German Rouladen

This month's recipe is another FVR member submission, Roulades (a dish in which a piece of food is coated with a sauce or filling and rolled up before being cooked, so that each slice has a spiral appearance), or *German Rouladen*.

Several members have provided their favorites already, please feel free to send me your favorite German recipe that you would be willing to share with the Fox Valley Region PCA membership.

FVR-PCA German Rouladen

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 pounds flank steak
- · German stone ground mustard, to taste
- 1/2 pound thick sliced bacon
- 2 large onions, sliced

- 1 (16 ounce) jar dill pickle slices
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 1/2 cups water
- 1 cube beef bouillon

Directions:

- Cut the flank steak into thin filets; about 1/4 inch thick and 3 inches wide.
- Generously spread one side of each filet with mustard to taste. Place bacon, onions and pickle slices on each filet and form into a roll. Use string or toothpicks to hold the roll together.
- Heat a skillet over medium heat and melt butter. Place the rolls in the butter and saute until browned.
- Pour in 2 1/2 cups of water and add the bouillon cube; stirring to dissolve the bouillon cube. Simmer the rolls for about an hour.

August 14 Agenda - 25th Anniversary Committee Meeting Minutes

Present: John Manki, Laura Prellwitz, Denny Ahlman, Barb Pankratz, Dan Pankratz, Bill Hewitt, Allan Utecht. Absent: Tom Robl, Jim Janes, Todd Benz

Meeting began at 6:35.

- Laura shared examples of some of the things she has obtained or created for the event.
- We have engraved wine bottles, one for each registered club member
- Dash plaque review for better clarification, it will be referred to as a data sheet, as "dash plaque" is not an apt description. Some modifications for the model Laura presented will be made.
- Ballots review. Numbers will be assigned to cars, rather than the use of owner's name. Ballot box has been made
- 40, 2 pocket yellow folders have been procured and will be used to create registration packets
 to give to all participants at the beginning of the rallye. Packets will include rally information,
 directions, safety precautions, map of the Landmark, etc.
- To participate in the rallye, there must be 2 people per car. One person alone trying to drive and read directions is simply too unsafe. People who register as singletons will be contacted by Laura or Dan and we will make efforts to "buddy up" that person.
- Pencils 720 golf pencils for visitors to use, and to use in rallye
- Emphasize to all participants that the RALLYE IS NOT A RACE.
- 6 trophies ordered, will try to get one as a preview to take to upcoming events
- 24 posters sent to Rick Malkemus to distribute around the property. 24 more given to Bob Hawley to distribute around Door County. Laura will deliver more in fall various businesses and public bulletin boards.
- Review map, layout of Landmark. There are a few logistical challenges as the property and activities at the resort are a bit spread out, but everything is manageable with everyone's help.
- Photography sites selected. Photographers will likely print the photos on site. Photos must be completed by 4:30 in order for photographers to have time to review photos and print the best one for each car. Deb and Jim will be working together on each car. They have battery powered lights if needed for "fill". We want to get a whole group photo as well. Members will need to be made aware of what time this will be so everyone can be included.
- Car wash soap purchased for car wash. Need 2 buckets (John Manki will provide these). Members need to bring their own towels. Denny Ahlman stated he would supervise the car wash area.
- Checkered flag for each person who completes rallye.
- 25th Anniversary flag from PCA about \$150. Do we want to purchase one? Committee discussed for several minutes. Group consensus is that it's not worth the cost. We might consider having our own banner created instead.
- Zone Rep and PCA National response to our invite to attend. Group discussed e-mail sent by our
 zone rep and that he will "attend only if he wants to" as there is a slight overlap with our event and
 Parade in French Lick, IN. He has indicated that he sees remaining at Parade as a higher priority.
 Similar comments have also been relayed from National staff. Consensus of the group is that
 representation from the Zone Rep or National Staff is not necessary or important to the success of
 our event.
- A couple of gentlemen who are attempting to "brand" Hwy. 42 (much like Route 66) would like

to dovetail with our event. They have offered to donate a few t-shirts and some window clings in exchange for the opportunity to put up a tent in or near the car show area to promote their interest. Committee agreed that this was acceptable. Laura will stay in touch with these men via e-mail and Facebook and will keep the committee updated.

- Committee members will continue to dialogue with members of the Bergstrom staff to see if they
 will possibly participate in our event in some fashion. We have been previously flatly turned down,
 but are going to try to continue communication a few more times before we give up or continue to
 be denied.
- Rick Malkemus will provide a table where the trophies can be displayed, and where ballots can be
 obtained and deposited. We will need someone to man this station during the event. Copies of old
 newsletter binders might also be in display in this area.
- Before rallye begins, each participant must sign the standard PCA waiver put on a wrist band (indicating they have signed the waiver), and be given the informational folder. Who will do this? Need to have a driver's meeting (Dan & Barb). Barb will be the first person to leave. Members of the anniversary committee will depart next. Dan will be the last car to depart. Laura will put folders with materials together. 2. Signage at Landmark - Laura will work with Rick Malkemus on Friday or Saturday afternoon to set this up.
- Laura will take cases of wine, Porsche luggage, trophies, etc. on to the Landmark on Thursday
 prior to the event and will store everything in Rick's office.
- Barb & Dan will collect and score rallye sheets, hand out checkered flag. Tally top three winners.
- Sell Porsche luggage raffle tickets at dinner, have drawing, announce winner.
- Share brief oral history of the club's beginnings during the awards presentation, following dinner.
- Thank you gift for Rick. John Manki suggested purchasing something from the Porsche catalog. We could also possibly give him one of the 25th anniversary shirts.
- Anniversary shirts on order. Should be arriving this week. Will sell at upcoming events. When they're gone, they are gone.
- Someone needs hand out ballots and pencils, then empty ballot box and count votes for Peoples' Choice.
- Laura will give Rick final headcount for dinner, breakfast, etc. Will review menu with banquet staff in April or May.
- Announce winners and hand out trophies at conclusion of dinner. Hand out photos and bottles

Note: as of 8/15/14, Rick Malkemus, and the general manager of the Landmark and President of the Egg Harbor Business Association, Jeff Larson, have agreed to be judges. Laura has since also contacted Tim Bergstrom, Shane Hecker, and Craig Roloff from Bergstrom Porsche; the village administrator of Egg Harbor, the President of the

FVR ID Badge Update


New Fox Valley Region ID Badges are available!
