



Trip of a lifetime!

After nearly 53 years I was able to fulfill a lifelong desire of mine and return to Germany. I was originally born in Germany and adopted by a US military family. I won't waste time on the details but in December of 2016 I got word that my birth mother had been found so with that shocking news, my planning kicked into high gear.

Dee was excited but hesitant and served as a great stabilizing force keeping me on task as I worked out an itinerary to try and maximize our time in Europe. I wanted to try and see the city where I was born, the village where my adopted parents lived and the USAF Radar Base where my dad was stationed. From there we headed out into the countryside to start our adventure. Stunning vistas greeted our eyes and touched our emotions. Castles were toured, breweries visited and many miles, 2300 to be exact, were driven through Germany, Austria, Luxembourg and Belgium.

After staying a couple of days north of Frankfurt, seeing some sights we headed out on our adventure. We head-



and civilians who suffered through the Battle of the Bulge during the winter of 1944/1945.

The final part of our adventure scratched my racing itch. A visit to the F1 track at Spa Francorchamps and then a lap of the Nurburgring.....at 50 mph.....in a diesel. Enough said.

Our adventure finally took us through the Mosel River valley and Germany's famous wine country.

Tech tips

Windshield maintenance

With proper maintenance, you can eliminate the haze, sun glare and improve night vision.

Clean the road grime from your windshield — that's the film, road residue left on your windshield that you don't notice until it rains, you are driving at night or driving in bright sun light.

Here is a process that will improve your visibility. Wash your windshield using a soft brush or rag and soap; rinse clean. Make up a paste of the cleanser "Bon-Ami" and water, apply to a wet sponge and scrub the entire windshield. Rewash the windshield and dry. Finish the process using Rain-X per their directions.


DO NOT use any other household cleansers, they

will scratch and damage your windshield.

Bon Ami, which is French for "good friend" is a brand name of a household cleaner using the slogan "Hasn't Scratched Yet." This product won't scratch and is biodegradable and non-toxic.

As always, check with your Porsche dealer or your owner's manual before using this process.

Extra tip: While cleaning your windshield, clean your wiper blades also. Wet a rag with alcohol and scrub the wiper blade's rubber edge.

The Common View: 2007 911 Carrera S test-drive

By Bob Dean Before the sun gave way to filtered fall light and the leaves began to fall, I had the pleasure of driving a 2007 911 Carrera S Coupe.

Black exterior and tan leather interior, this 911 power plant contained a 3.8L flat six and a wonderful six-



speed manual transmission. Tinted windows and a fixed spoiler added to the ambiance, as did the colored crests at the center of the wheels. The sports car had less than 50,000 miles from new and was listed for \$39,869.

Similar to the 911 Targa 4 GTS I reviewed a while back, the 2007 911 S is no longer available. But as always, the knowledgeable team at Bergstrom Premier can assist you with selecting another example, upon request. I highly recommend you speak with Nick Halfman or James Zingsheim to have them assist you in finding your dream car. While the 911 S I drove is no longer available, I share this review to demonstrate the pre-owned 911s are every bit of joy to drive as are their newer brethren.

Climbing into the 911 welcomed you to very comfortable leather seats. As in other Porsches, the controls are within easy reach and mostly intuitive to operate. Though I tend to be one to read the manual for every car I own, it certainly wasn't necessary to review any documents to be able to operate the sports car before taking it on the highway for an enjoyable ride.

The 911sunroof was covered with what almost felt like the Alcantara material. I had never experienced that décor before in a 911 and I liked it a lot. The car handled very well, was quick and had very smooth shifting. Steering was as responsive as the accelerator and the brakes were in good shape. Power delivery was consistent and smooth, even at speed on the highway. The exhaust note particularly came alive at

about 4,000 revs, which added an aural display to the rest of the experience. There is nothing quite like the note that comes from a flat six 911 engine when you reach the mid-rev range.



Adding to the nostalgia of the sports car, to the upper left of the entertainment console, the 911 had physical phone keys to allow you to use a cell phone. In the age of touchscreens and ever more technological advances that almost remove us from interacting with a car, having tactile keys is a comforting throwback to the days when more direct interaction was the rule of the day.

Driving the 997 911, or any 911 for that matter, adds an instant sense of unpretentious cool to the driving expe-

rience. There are few other sports cars that can please both the casual observer and the purist. And there are no other sports cars that can lay claim to the vast performance history that has been made at race tracks and weekend road trips most anywhere in the world.

As I drove the 911 down Interstate 41, the comfortable and responsive drive made me feel as if I were a part of the car. The handling is almost intuitive and a slight turn of the wheel or slight release of the accelerator leads the car exactly where you want it to be. And the available acceleration, even at highway speed, is absolutely fun to experience as well as practical in navigating the sometimes-perilous mob of afternoon commuters.

When I completed the drive, I did not want to give the keys back! I came up with a series of daydream explanations I could provide to my wife to explain why we not only needed to buy this car, but we had to do so. A handy gizmo that would make the perfect gift

In past years I have written a Whalestales column as sort of a "letter to Santa's little helpers."

I have recently discovered a product that no gear head, college student, or fleet manager should ever be without. I'm talking about a Lithium Ion Jump Pack or "jump starter" as they're often called.

What do they do you ask? Imagine jump starting a totally dead 12v battery on any of your cars, lawn and garden equipment, boat, cell phone, mp3 player or tablets. Now imagine that this device is only as big as a box of mac and cheese and weighs about 2-3 lbs. And when it gets tired, as indicated by the built in gauge, simply charge it up.

A miracle you say?

I have had a couple of these lithium polymer packs for over a year now. They are basically a cell phone battery on mega steroids. I have personally started neighbors' cars, my ol' John Deere lawn tractor, a car at the gas station, and all on a single charge! Not kidding. These are not to be confused with the old lead acid jump packs

of the '80s and '90s that went dead every month sitting on a shelf, and on their best day could barely start a lawn tractor. Modern packs can deliver 400, 600, 800 or more cranking amps (theoretically, the more you pay the more cranking amps you should get). For the techies out there, most manufacturers rate them in milliamps which means thousandths of an amp (i.e.: 60,000mA = 60Ampere).

Just like a normal car battery, you buy larger for your larger displacement toys. But even the smallest packs can fire up a modern car in good tune. Several of our members have small fleets of cars, so therefore they don't always get started as often as they should. That's where these come in handy. That much energy bottled up in one of these can power up your cell phone for a month of Sundays during a power outage. In addition, most have multiple USB ports and LED flashlights built in too. They also stay charged in a trunk for months at a time and can be topped off from a cigarette lighter or a wall wort in the house. Manufacturers suggest that they hold about 70% of their charge after sitting for 2 years.

They are readily available locally at any of the national

chain automotive stores, big box home stores, Fleet Farm, Wal-Mart, Harbor Freight, etc. at a price that won't break the bank. Depending on ampere rating, prices start on eBay for less than \$30 for a Chinese knock off to maybe \$150 for a top of the line local purchase with all the accessories. Oh, by the way. Truth be told, the pack I used to start the friends and neighbors' cars referenced above was a eBay Hong Kong knockoff. Schumacher and Noco are a couple of trade names that are usually highly rated, but do your own research on Amazon or similar sites. The better ones are DOE rated.

I strongly recommend these for all your kids and grandkids cars. 'Tis the season.

Nobody who owns a Porsche, or any other vehicle for that matter, should ever be without one.
